

ARTISTS IN LOVE: INTIMATE PARTNERSHIPS IN THE HISTORY OF ART ACLT6228

Course Outline - Online

Description:

Love relationships between artists raise poignant questions about the connection between intimacy and creativity. By examining couples from the world of visual arts in the 19th and 20th centuries, we'll see the compatibility and/or disharmony of artist relationships and creative expression. Using digital images to stimulate discussion, we'll discuss the lives, works, and artistic significance of couples including Camille Claudel and Auguste Rodin, Frida Kahlo and Diego Rivera, and Canadians Mary Pratt and Christopher Pratt.

Course Goals: To educate students about the individual lives, personal interactions, and famous artworks of well-known members of artistic couples.

Course Objectives:

At the completion of this course, the student will be able to understand the major biographical events in each artistic couple's personal and professional life, and the interconnection of these two seemingly separate spheres. The student will also recognize that this correlation was particularly profound for the woman artist. Finally, the student will be able to acquire a general sense of each artist's individual artistic style.
