

French at Noon: The Basics Pt II

LANG6352

Course Outline - In Class

Description: Continue from The Basics Part I to further develop your skills. Expand your vocabulary, grammar skills and knowledge of the French sound system. Expand your oral communication and listening skills via practical situations. Take advantage of the more leisurely pace offered by French at Noon.

Course Goals: As a follow-up to The Basics: Part I, the aim of this course is to build on participants' newly acquired understanding of how the language "works". You will study numbers, pronunciation, more vocabulary and expressions, and regular verbs as well as a few common irregular verbs. You will have opportunities to practice using the vocabulary and structures covered in class and will gain a fundamental knowledge that you can build upon in future courses.

Course Objectives: At the completion of this course, the student will:

- be able to ask and answer simple questions in everyday situations
- have a small repertoire of French vocabulary
- understand basic sentence structures and verb usage

Evaluation:

This is a graded course where a complete or incomplete will be issued. Evaluation will be based on attendance and completion of course activities. Participants can miss no more than two classes.

Due to the length of this course, students cannot be absent for more than **2 classes**. If a student is unable to attend class due to illness, they may attend virtually as long as the instructor is informed at least **24 hours** in advance. The option to attend class virtually will only be offered to those who are unable to attend in-person due to illness, and only up to twice per course. If a student is not present for a class, whether in-person or virtually, this will be considered an absence.

There will be either three (3) quizzes to be completed through OWL at regular intervals throughout the course (a greater assortment of exercises will be available, and may count towards participation; however, only the quizzes will be graded). Altogether, these quizzes will constitute 75% of the final grade. All content needed to succeed in the evaluations is presented in-class and on the slides for each week.

Active participation constitutes the other graded component for this course (25%). Please see the following section, Participation Grading Chart, for a detailed breakdown of different levels of participation and the corresponding grades.

Participation Grading Chart:

The following chart will act as a guide for assessing student participation in the course.

Grade	Criteria
9-10	The student participates frequently, providing relevant responses and over the

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length of the course actively replies to discussion questions, instructor comments, and other students in a positive manner, always incorporating French.

- 7-8 The student participates consistently, providing relevant responses and over the length of the course actively offers new ideas and responds to the contributions of others, nearly always incorporating French.
- The student provides some relevant contributions and occasionally offers new ideas, making some effort to formulate thoughts in French.
- The student's contributions are inconsistent in incorporating French language concepts from the course. The student does not offer many new ideas, and responses to class discussions are few.
- The student rarely participates, rarely provides responses, and rarely responds to the comments and contribution of others, and does so primarily in English.
- 0-3 The student makes minimal effort to apply French language concepts in responding to class discussion. The student only contributes when specifically asked by the instructor.
