Course Outline

Description:

Your vocabulary is a vital communication tool -- make sure you are using it correctly. This course teaches the history and mechanics of the English language to assist students to develop and employ an expressive and professional vocabulary. This course is tailored to any individual who wishes to communicate clearly, persuasively and precisely. Classes will include a combination of open quizzes/exercises, chapter presentations and related overviews and open discussion.

Course Goals:

The course is aimed at helping students become independently aware of ways to enhance their use of the English language during the writing and expressive process through instruction, hands-on exercises and open class discussion.

It is also aimed at providing students the tools and abilities necessary to solve their English vocabulary questions and select the appropriate words to convey their ideas most effectively.

Course Objectives:

At the completion of this course, the student will be able to recognize opportunities to enhance their use of the English language and use the appropriate resources they need to independently select appropriate and effective words to communicate effectively.
