ART AND THE HOLOCAUST

Course Outline

Description:

With the recent 70th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz, this illustrated course examines how art was used as a tool of propaganda under Nazi dictatorship, and the ways in which victims created art within their tragic circumstances. We will also discover how some artists from the Post-War years until now have treated the Holocaust theme in their work as an act of remembrance and hope.

Course Goals:

- Identify some of the ways that art was used by the Nazis as a tool of propaganda
- Understand select problems associated with creating, studying, and memorializing art of the Holocaust
- Recognize general and distinctive ways that artists during and after the War have addressed Holocaust themes
- Comprehend some of the major legal and ethical issues associated with the restitution of Nazi-stolen art

Course Objectives: At the completion of this course, the student will be able to understand the significant and various roles of art during the Holocaust --- for the Nazis and their victims.
