

SPANISH AT NOON: BEYOND THE BASICS LANG6453

Course Outline

Description:

Expand upon the knowledge acquired in Spanish: The Basics and begin to develop an impressive Spanish repertoire. This course will enhance your repertoire of verbs and vocabulary. In addition, you will commence sentence formation based on an increased knowledge of grammar and pronunciation. Emphasis will be placed on common situations so you will soon feel comfortable expressing yourself in Spanish.

In this course, the student will have the opportunity of learning vocabulary, grammar and expressions at an intermediate level of Spanish, while playing different games, interacting with others and practicing speech skills. The student will also learn how to conjugate and build phrases in several verb tenses, being able to build complex phrases, paragraphs and challenging conversations.

It is important to review the material assigned by the instructor and memorize new words and expressions, as well as grammar structures after each class. In this way, the student will be enhancing his or her skills of communication in Spanish, being able to use recently learned content in the following session. The topics are flexible and depend on the interest of the group and learning speed. Therefore the lectures may change as the course progresses.

Course Goals:

To build reading, listening and speech skills in present tense, communicating effectively with commonly used Spanish vocabulary and expressions.

Course Objectives:

At the completion of this course, the student will be able to build sentences in diverse tenses, conjugating verbs and use important expressions and vocabulary in Spanish.
